BAILEY WAS DIAGNOSED WITH AUTISM ON JUNE 13, 2001... LESS THAN 4 MONTHS BEFORE HIS 2ND BIRTHDAY

We began raising funds for the National Alliance for Autism Research (NAAR) in September 2001.

In 2005, NAAR merged with Autism Speaks.

In 2008, Bailey's Team became a non-profit organization, formed a Board of Directors, and created our own grant funding process.

In 2013 we celebrated our first 5 years as a non-profit organization (although we had been raising funds for 12 years)!

In 2018 we celebrated 10 years as a non-profit organization...

And on October 24th, all past and present Board Members will celebrate our 15th year as a non-profit organization raising funds and awareness in support of individuals with autism and their families!

A Message from the President **FAMILY UPDATE**

Dear Friends,

Another six months have gone by and I'm happy to report that Bailey is doing great! However, it seems when it comes time to sit down to write our story, we experience somewhat of an "episode" to remind us of why we do this work. Before I get to the recent event, I prefer to share the positive... and there is so much to share!

Bailey's language has improved, and it amazes us to hear him putting several words together to form sentences. Years ago, I called these small victories, but there is nothing small about them. Hearing him talk is something we have never taken for granted. When he recites a full non-scripted sentence, it is music to our ears! For example, just recently he said, "I want to go home to North Attleboro soon." Although this meant leaving the Cape - something we prefer not to do - it was such a specific request and he had never used the word "soon" before. The simplest statements put a smile on our faces. While his language continues to improve, he is best able to articulate his thoughts when he wants something.

Bailey recently increased his hours at one of his programs, Mansfield Redemption. He is now attending two programs for a total of $4\frac{1}{2}$ days. He wakes up and follows a routine of snuggling with Mom and Dad (yes, even at age 24), then into the bathroom to wash-up, downstairs for a quick bowl of dry cereal, shoes on, and off he goes when his ride arrives between 7:15 and 8:00 am... a large window of time requiring us to have him up and ready early sometimes only to wait for nearly an hour to be picked up. 😫 Although he does well at both programs, he seems to favor his time at the Mansfield Redemption facility where he works a portion of the day. He is busy and very productive according to the staff and always has a smile on his face. With that said, he recently asked if the last day at his programs could be in December, and I told him "No." I explained this is because he is an adult and he has to work. I then offered him a vacation and he seemed pretty satisfied with that idea. So, our next excursion will be New York City - perhaps in November or December ... or even January – as much is coming up for the Robertsons in the next few months – more to come on page 2 about our other news!

We've spent a lot of time at the Cape, recently moving from one home to another – both in Chatham. We spent many months preparing for our move and preparing Bailey for the transition. We showed him his room as it was being completed and told him what it would look like. We visited the new house often to show him the progress and the space that would be his room, and the adjacent living space for his computer, drawing, TV watching, etc. He quickly acclimated to his new digs and continues to enjoy his time at the Cape, although he is clear when he tells us that he is not going. We have learned when to prepare him for a weekend excursion and at times, we opt to keep him home where he prefers to spend more time gaming than on his computer. He has rules for different places, and what he does at home is for North Attleboro, and how he spends his time at the Cape... is for the Cape.

The other night, we were preparing to go to bed, and Bailey was making noise downstairs. He was rustling through the closet, and we soon found out he was in search of glue: his "Bowser" plush doll had some loose fabric that needed reattaching. When he was unable to find the glue, he called for Mom and Dad to come and fix Bowser. Doug searched for his glue-gun to no avail. Bailey started to panic reciting "Techna" over and over again - a word we dread as it represents an impending catastrophe and Bailey's disenchantment to say the least. As Doug continued to look for the glue, I headed to CVS at 11:30 pm to get a new glue-gun and glue sticks. As I found the gun and began to notice they were out of glue sticks - which was the priority - Doug called to say he had found both the glue-gun and the glue sticks. It was as if someone was watching out for us, and our crisis was averted - but not until midnight! Doug was able to fix Bowser and Bailey was content. We all went to bed, but our angst and uneasiness continues whenever his autism gets too big.

BAILEY'S TEAM IS PROUD TO WELCOME MICHAEL ANDRADE TO OUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS



Michael Andrade, President and Chief Executive Officer of The Arc of Bristol County, is a Licensed Independent Clinical Social Worker and has over 25 years of experience in the non-profit arena. Michael's work includes developing and managing services for children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families. He began his career in the non-profit sector as a Direct Support Specialist of a local RI chapter of The Arc. He later assumed the role of Chief Operating Officer for United Cerebral Palsy of Rhode Island, and in 2000, he joined The Arc of Kent County (RI) as Vice President of Adult Services. In 2003, Michael became the President and CEO of The Arc of Bristol County. Under his leadership The Arc has grown to be a multifaceted human service organization supporting over 2,600 individuals and families across Bristol County, MA, and RI.

and RI. In addition, Michael serves on many coalitions and statewide boards in the area of disability policy and has served as an Adjunct Professor at Rhode Island College for over 15 years.

More on The Arc...(from an interview with Michael published in the Sun Chronicle)

The Arc is an organization that was designed by families over 60 years ago to ensure that their loved ones could stay in their local communities. The Arc of Bristol County provides services to support individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities to be as successful as possible.

The Arc works closely with each individual or family to maximize their physical and social well-being, while collaborating with nonprofit, educational, and governmental agencies to facilitate services, foster community partnerships, and promote self-advocacy.

"The Arc works with the families to educate them... it's about us helping people and making sure that we can maximize their eligibility for whatever public services are available," Michael added.

Although the majority of individuals served by The Arc are adults, services are available to children 3 years and older. Once the child with special needs is eligible to start school, educational advocacy is available. Assistance is provided to ensure that the school system fulfills its responsibility to develop an Individual Education Plan (IEP) for the child.

"It's our job to make sure that the school is honest and open about what each child's needs are. And, more importantly, what resources are available to address those needs," Michael explained. "The Arc tries to empower the family to have a voice."

One of Michael's passions is to support immigrant families. When asked about the challenges of working with the immigrant population, Michael indicates that many unfortunately fear that agency or government outreach will result in the removal of the individual with special needs from the family unit. Families fear losing control of the care of their loved one.

In addition, Michael admits that the stigma around mental health can still be hard to disprove, and language and cultural differences can be barriers for immigrants who need counseling and treatment. One of his goals is to help remove those barriers and assist these families find the support they need.

Under Michael's leadership, The Arc expanded from \$1 million to \$12 million in annual revenues representing unfathomable growth – all in an effort to help individuals be happy, healthy, and successful!




